

Speaker Biographies

Donald B. Moulds, is the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Prior to becoming Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary, Mr. Moulds served as Vice President for the California Medical Association's Center for Medical and Regulatory Policy. In that capacity, he oversaw the development of the association's health policy initiatives, guided its positions on state legislation, and oversaw all of its state regulatory work.

From 2004 through 2007, Mr. Moulds was the director of the Senate Office of Research, the bipartisan research arm of the California State Senate. There he was responsible for developing the Senate's research agenda on everything from health care to water policy, overseeing the Senate's policy-related publications, and managing the Senate's relations with the federal government. From 1998 through 2004 Mr. Moulds served as Principal Consultant to Senate President Pro Tempore, John Burton and was the lead staffer in the Senate on numerous issues, including insurance, health system reform, and select labor issues.

Mr. Moulds has served on numerous boards and commissions, including the State Compensation Insurance Fund Board, the Advisory Board of the California Health Policy Research Council, the Advisory Board of the Sacramento Campus of the University of Southern California, the Advisory Committee of the Workers Compensation Research Institute, the Steering Committee of the University of California's Policy Research Center, and the State of California Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act Implementation Advisory Board.

Mr. Moulds holds a BA degree from Bates College and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in philosophy from the University of Illinois. He has taught philosophy and ethics courses at the University of Illinois, Harvard University, and California State University, Sacramento.

Charles Ingoglia, MSW, is the Vice President, Public Policy, National Council for Behavioral Healthcare. With more than fifteen years experience in behavioral healthcare, Charles Ingoglia has worked as a provider, advocate, and educator for government and public sector organizations.

In his current role, Mr. Ingoglia directs the federal affairs function of the nonprofit trade association as well as its policy and technical assistance outreach to more than 1,700 member organizations across the nation. Most recently, his efforts have centered on key issues such as parity, healthcare reform, and increasing access and retention in community behavioral healthcare.

Prior to joining the National Council, Mr. Ingoglia provided policy and program design guidance, including the review of state Medicaid Waiver applications and other Health and Human Services regulations to the Center for Mental Health Services at the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration under the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

His previous experience also includes directing state government relations and service system improvement projects for the National Mental Health Association, serving as a policy analyst for the National Association of Social Workers, and designing educational programs for mental health and addictions professionals for the Association of Ambulatory Behavioral Healthcare. In addition, he has worked in a transitional shelter with homeless persons and provided individual, group and couples counseling at the Whitman-Walker Clinic in Washington, DC.

Long committed to social service and education, Mr. Ingoglia also spends his time as adjunct faculty at the George Washington University Graduate School of Political Management and as a volunteer with local social work and youth health organizations.

Herb Schultz is Regional Director at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Region IX. Region IX includes the states of Arizona, California, Nevada, Hawaii, the territories of American Samoa, Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands, and Guam, as well as the freely associated states of the Federated States of Micronesia, Republic of Marshall Islands, and Republic of Palau. In this role, he serves as HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius' key representative in the Region, ensuring that close contact is maintained by the federal government with state, local, tribal, and territorial governmental and external, non-governmental partners on a wide range of health and social service issues. In addition, the HHS Secretary's 10 Regional Directors/Regional Offices work actively to address the needs of communities and individuals served through HHS programs and policies.

Previously, Mr. Schultz was Senior Advisor to Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, and since January of this year, also the Director of the California Recovery Task Force. In this role, he is responsible for the oversight and implementation of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. As Senior Advisor to the Governor from 2008-2010, he represented the Governor on major domestic policy issues, which included serving as a principal advisor on health care reform. Previously, he served as the Senior Health Policy Advisor to the Governor during California's 2006-2008 state debate on comprehensive health care reform. From 2005-2006, he served as Vice President of Government Programs for McKesson Health Solutions, where he oversaw the company's disease management and nurse advice programs for Medicaid and Medicare beneficiaries. During the first year of Governor Schwarzenegger's Administration, Mr. Schultz served as Acting Director of the California Employment Development Department.

He also previously served as a member of former Governor Gray Davis' Cabinet as Acting Secretary for the Labor and Workforce Development Agency. He served as the Agency's Undersecretary before his Cabinet-Level appointment, and remained in both roles until the end of the Davis Administration. Prior to that, he was Deputy Director of External Affairs for the California Department of Managed Health Care, and served as Director of the Advisory Committee on Managed Health Care.

Mr. Schultz received his BA in Political Science and International Studies from The American University in Washington, DC and has a Master's Degree in Public Policy from Georgetown University, also in Washington, DC.

Sandra Naylor Goodwin, PhD, MSW, is the founding (1993) Executive Director of the California Institute for Mental Health. With nearly 30 years of professional experience, Dr. Goodwin has experience and knowledge of administration, treatment and service methodologies, and planning and policy development at the county and state levels. Dr. Goodwin served as the Director of the Placer County Mental Health, Alcohol, and Drug Abuse from 1981 to 1988. During that time she was active with the California Conference of Local Mental Health Directors, serving in many capacities, including president. Dr. Goodwin also possesses a wealth of knowledge concerning the governance structure of the California Mental Health System. While serving as Principal Consultant to the Assembly Health Committee of the California State Legislature, she developed a series of fiscal and program reform legislation, including mental health realignment, MediCal consolidation, California Mental Health Master Plan requirements, and California compliance to the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Dr. Goodwin was deeply involved in developing the county-based system of care with the managed care for the delivery of specialty mental health Medi-Cal services. More recently, she has been directing a CiMH initiative on Values Driven Evidence Based Practices, with a major focus on cultural competency, recovery, and resiliency. And currently Dr. Goodwin is developing a strategy for implementation supports, training and technical assistance to assist the implementation of the Mental Health Services Act (Proposition 63), passed by California voters in November 2004. The focus of this effort is on transformation of mental health services to support a recovery process.

Dr. Goodwin serves on a number of boards and commissions, including the National Association of County Behavioral Health Directors, the County Behavioral Health Institute, the California State Council on Women's Health, the California Women's Mental Health Policy Council, and the Placer County First Five Commission. Dr. Goodwin possesses a Doctorate in Clinical Psychology and a Master of Social Work degree.
