Sutter/Yuba is requesting **\$914,730.00** for three Innovation Programs over a three-year period:

- Improve Mental Health Outcomes via Interagency Collaboration and Service Delivery Learning for Supervised Offenders who are at risk of or have a Serious Mental Illness.
- A Culturally Competent Collaboration to Address Serious Mental Illness in the traditional Hmong Population.
- Continued Mental Health and Wellness Support for the New Post-TAY Clients who are in recovery from a Serious Mental Illness.

Improve Mental Health Outcomes via Interagency Collaboration and Service Delivery Learning for Supervised Offenders who are at risk of or have a Serious Mental Illness.

- The aim of this project is to increase the quality of mental health services and associated mental health outcomes, including co-occurring substance abuse disorders.
- While both counties will provide a dedicated mental health clinician for offenders with mental illness, the innovative element will be the different approaches utilized. Sutter will use a centralized, front-loaded mental health service approach. Yuba will employ a de-centralized, community-based approach to service delivery.
- The two service delivery strategies will be evaluated to see whether either or both models enhances collaboration and strengthens working relationships and outcomes.

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Sutter/Yuba Innovation Program Detail

A Culturally Competent Collaboration to address Serious Mental Illness in the traditional Hmong Population.

- The aim of this project is to bridge the gap between Western concepts and traditional Hmong beliefs by bringing together mental health clinical staff with healers from the Hmong community.
- The innovative element will be the integration of traditional healing practices with western mental health treatment by having mental health staff meet with the client and the selected traditional healer to understand the client's needs and the healer's diagnosis to facilitate a treatment strategy through cultural collaboration.
- The bridged approach will be evaluated through surveys and data will be captured when both western mental health treatment and traditional Hmong practices were offered. The development and testing of a culturally appropriate evaluation is a key component.

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Sutter/Yuba Innovation Program Detail

\$238,451

Continued Mental Health and Wellness support for the New Post-TAY Clients who are in recovery from a Serious Mental Illness.

- **The aim of this project is to provide an array of mental health services to youth who are aging out of the TAY Full Service Partnership (FSP) and whose recovery support needs would not be well served in an adult FSP program.**
- **The Innovative element will use an Intervention Counselor to provide mental health services and facilitate connections to community resources. Not merely create a bridge to ongoing adult mental health services, the goal for this program is to successfully launch these young people into the community and support them in their recovery from mental illness as they transition to adulthood.**
- **The Milestones of Recovery Scale (MORS), a standardized tool that measures recovery from mental illness, will be used to assess crisis readmission rates for youth in this pilot and compare that against rates for individuals who are not part of the post-TAY project.**
